NETWORK REVIEW

For those of you who are not aware there is a review of how the Scout network operates being undertaken. Our local workshop was on 3rd December at BP House London. Now that we have attended the workshop there is a lot of information we need to understand and work out a way forward.

So far all I can tell you is that East Sussex has agreed that the Scout Network should go to District level, and the following statement that has been issued by HQ.

As soon as we know more we will pass the information on.

DELIVERY AND MANAGEMENT OF THE SCOUT NETWORK

Responding to feedback from across the UK, it has been agreed that from January 2007, Districts will be able to host Scout Networks directly, but only with the agreement of the County/Area Commissioner (in consultation with the Scout Network Commissioner). The County/Area will still retain overall Management of the provision.

The role of the Scout Network Leaders will be redefined, refocused and strengthened under new arrangements. There will also be a requirement that all Scout Networks must have someone appointed to the role of Scout Network Leader.

The current automatic membership of the Scout Network for all 18 -25 year olds will cease. Young people who wish to join the Scout Network will have to positively opt in by becoming a Member of the Section.

THE PROGRAMME

The Programme for the Scout Network will be simplified to make it more appropriate for the age group and will be resourced accordingly.

I look forward to being able to provide more definite details in due course.

EAST SUSSEX - AWARD PANEL

A Queens Scout and Explorer Belt Awards Panel is in the process of being re-launched with in East Sussex.

As it applies to the awards themselves it is not section specific. le It is there for Explorer Scouts as well as Network Scouts.

WHY DO WE HAVE AN AWARDS PANEL.

It is important that with awards as high as the Explorer belt and the Queens Scout award that everyone across the Scout County of East Sussex have the opportunity to go for their awards on a level playing field. That is to say that the level of effort put into gaining

their award for somebody in one part of the county is comparable to the effort put in by somebody in another part of the county. For this reason the awards panel needs to be involved from the outset in the planning stages for your Explorer Belt and Queens Scout Award.

The last thing anyone would want is for you to get half way through an award only to find that from the planning stage you weren't aiming high enough.

WHO MAKES UP THE A WARDS PANEL

The Awards panel is made of people from both a county level

and district level. The County people need to be there to ensure that a level playing field is maintained, whilst people from the district are there to ensure local knowledge of the young people concerned is part of the mix.

Both parts of the Awards panel work as a team to ensure that you get the most of your Scouting.

OPEN DOORS SESSIONS

An Open Doors session is an evening set aside so that anyone who is either interested in starting their Queens Scout award or

Explorer belt, or is in the process undertaking these awards can pop along and either register or discuss their progress to date. These sessions will be made available throughout the year and in different locations within the county in order to make it as easy as possible to get to. KENYA 2006 PROJECT - NYERI

This project has been a long time in the making. Some of us formed part of the team that went to Kenya in 2000. Having gained experience then, we started to organise another project for 2003. Unfortunately due to ill health the project had to be cancelled. We then had to start all over again with the organisation, fund raising etc for the project we have just returned home from.

transport to the Rowallen Scout camp site in Niarobi, arriving there at midnight. Once we had organised ourselves, and had a chat with a Network group from England, we settled down to a well deserved rest. The following day our transport to take us to Nyeri was due at 10:00. At 15:00 we gave up trying to contact them and arranged an alternative again.



We flew out to Kenya on Saturday 29th July, with an early start at the District HQ in Seaford. This unfortunately was not without incident, as a section of the rear bumper, including light cluster mysteriously detached itself from the rear of the mini bus. We should have taken this as a sign from the heavens as transport was to become our one and only real issue through out the entire trip. After a quick repair in true Scouting style using elephant tape we where on our way. Once we had boarded the required plane at Heathrow some of us where guite relieved to find that a Kenya Airways Economy class seat has got in flight entertainment, but more importantly doesn't have goats roaming freely in the gangways.

Upon our arrival at Niarobi we where to discover more problems lay in wait for us. A tent had gone missing in the cargo luggage, never to be seen again. Or at least, never to be seen again by us. Also the transport that had been booked and confirmed by email, to pick us up at the airport didn't arrive.

We managed to organise other

Upon our arrival at Nyeri we where given a very warm welcome by one of the local Scout leaders. We where given the use of 2 separate guest houses complete with hot showers. One for the lads and one for the lasses.

The following day we set up camp in a local school field. The school was our preferred option for camping as the security was good. The School was surrounded by a high wall, locked gates and had a 24-7 security man.

We set up camp on the last day of school so during the dinner break we where besieged by the pupils who wanted to find out as much about us as possible, in a very short period of time. Unfortunately they all wanted to do it simultaneously.

Having set up camp we where then able to start on the project work we had decided to undertake.

The construction of the building was already underway as we had forwarded monies to the Kenyan Scouts earlier in the year. As

most of the walls where up, it was up to us to construct the roof trusses we would require next.

In order for the camp to be run efficiently we split ourselves into 3 teams of varying sizes. They where the food/cooking team, the site clearance/ground levelling team and the roof trusses/Pole lathe team.

Everyone worked extremely hard on the project work with there being several 07:00 starts, meaning getting up at 05:30. Also we ensured that the British Scouts and the Kenyan Scouts where mixed in the work parties and that where people wanted to, they where able to change from one work party to another.

This work carried on for the best part of a week until we where in a position to start training the Kenyan Scouts in the use of pole lathes, and assist where possible with the construction of the roof, using the roof trusses we had already made.

It gave a great sense of achievement to all the team to be able to see the corrugated sheets being nailed into place on the roof of the building. That is until we ran out of corrugated sheets as there wasn't enough available locally and we had to wait for some to come from Nairobi.

The next couple of days where spent on tourist type activities such as spending a night at "The Ark", a hotel situated within a nature reserve, overlooking a watering hole, and going on a safari.

We had the opportunity to visit BPs grave, where we invested 4 people into the Scout Network.

We also stopped of at the equator so we could witness water spiralling different ways down a plug hole. Unfortunately the side effect was that we got accosted by the local shop keepers, all wanting to sell us wooden giraffes.

Before we left Nyeri we returned to have a look at the Scout Hut to see how it had progressed. We where glad to see that the ridges where now all on and the roof was complete.

We then returned to Niarobi camping at the NPS (National Park Services) camp site for a couple of days. This gave us time to visit the giraffe sanctuary, the baby elephant sanctuary and the town market in Niarobi, before returning home.

The market was an experience in itself and you had to be willing to barter with the shop keepers. If you didn't you either didn't buy anything or you paid well over the odds. Just as an example I bought a wooden carving. This was marked up at KES 15,000. After bartering for some time I paid KES 500, a price the shop keeper was still happy with.

During our return there was much discussion amongst the team about when we where going out next. Not if, but when.

The project was a success. All the objectives we set out to achieve, we achieved. We left the Kenyan Scouts with 2 working pole lathes, they can use to make things to sell. They now have the start of a new Scout hut, where before they had nothing. The building still needs doors, windows, plastering inside and out, but our work will be completed by other Scouts from East Sussex. It may not be this year, but it will be the year after.

If you are the work hard, play hard type there is no better way of helping your brother Scouts than by joining one of the Kenya project teams, ask any of the Kenya 2006 team and they will tell you I'm right.
