High-speed rail may be coming to the Peninsula sooner than what was originally thought, the chairman of the California High-Speed Rail Authority said at a standingroom-only meeting in Mountain View last night.

Dan Richard told a legislative committee led by state Sen. Joe Simitian that his agency plans to start construction in the Central Valley and at the two ends of the system

Los Angeles and the Peninsula
at the same time.

Richard, who was appointed by Gov. Jerry Brown last month to head the rail agency, said his staff is fully behind Simitian's "blended" proposal [See HSR, page 26]

Chamber may get a new home

It appears likely that Palo Alto's Chamber of Commerce and the group that advocates for downtown businesses will get new homes in the four-story office building proposed for the corner of Alma Street and Lytton Avenue, the site of a former Shell station.

City Council, during a 5¹/₂-hour session Monday, redesigned what's called the Lytton Gateway project, reducing it

from five stories to four, and eliminated 14 apartments, including seven that had been proposed for low-income tenants.

Council sent the project back to its planning staff, which would negotiate [See CHAMBER, page 26]
