• Religious Aspects of Domestic Violence

Clergy - leaders of the church who decide what should be emphasized from the pulpit. Church Workers such as religious education directors, youth ministers, and others in similar positions of authority.

Church Volunteers such as Sunday school teachers, youth program workers, music ministers and musicians. Mental Health Professionals - those who see the victims in counseling and need a knowledge of religious teachings that impact domestic violence.

• Crisis Counseling, Trauma & Response: A Multi-level Approach

This three day seminar is intended for three levels of mental health intervention in disaster: the most immediate responders, usually paraprofessionals,: the more long-term intervenors, mental health professionals; and those who supervise both short and long term mental health response.

trains and consults extensively on trauma, trauma therapy, vicarious traumatization, and community response to disaster and trauma. She is the principal author and presenter of the Colorado State Training in Crisis Counseling.

9:00 am-4:00 pm Outreach School Bldg., Beta House, Medicine Bow Room This workshop deals with the Nature of Domestic Violence (statistics, power, why it continues, roadblocks, do's and don'ts); Perpetrator's Excuses (e.g., blaming the victim, "the bible says...", drinking and drugging); Domestic Violence as Learned Behavior (accepted by society, accepted by the church, taught in the media, "not caused by...", assault); Domestic Violence and Scripture (Gospel, Hebrew and Christian passages); Protection Orders (how to get them, who is most knowledgeable, what good is a piece of paper?). The workshop will include role playing and group exercises. This course is certified by P.O.S.T. for Peace Officers, Detention Officers, Dispatchers, and Coroners. (6 Contact Hours)

8:00 am-5:00 pm Outreach School Bldg., Beta House, Medicine Bow Room This three day seminar is intended for three levels of mental health intervention in disaster: the most immediate responders, usually paraprofessionals,: the more long-term intervenors, mental health professionals; and those who supervise both short and long term mental health response. The three days build upon each other, although day two can be taken as a stand-alone unit. Supervisors should attend at least days two and three. In this seminar, participants will learn trauma-informed crisis response, with the ultimate aim of ameliorating--or even preventing--trauma acquisition and loss of functioning. The latest research in the field will be discussed, including topics such as timing of interventions, the advisability of debriefing, and the impact of trauma on special populations, such as children. (21 total Contact Hours, 7 per day)

SUICIDE RISK ASSESSMENT AND RISK REDUCTION: TACTICS FOR THE TRENCHES

May 3, 2003

8:00 am-5:00 pm Outreach School Bldg., Beta House, Meadowlark Room This workshop focuses on enhancing the participant's knowledge of pragmatic approaches to suicide risk assessment; recognition of common and potentially fatal errors in risk assessment; and risk assessment tactics that support the potential for positive intervention. We will identify the ways in which the traditional suicide assessment questions (ideation, plan and means) are inadequate, the flaws of suicide prediction in contrast to the value of risk assessment, and the risks and benefits of various short-term responses to suicide risk, such as hospitalization versus outpatient treatment. The emphasis is on assessment approaches and options for immediate response to risk, rather than on psychotherapy techniques.

GOAL: To provide essential information in suicide risk assessment and short-term risk reduction, for individuals who may need to perform some level of risk assessment in the course of their professional duties. (7 Contact Hours)
