Human: Meet Horse - Equine Stress Control

Maxine Doner, ESMT 2, RN

Maxine has been raising, training, and breeding her Tennessee Walking horses for 15 years. Maxine isa registered nurse. She has been doing equine massage, energy work, acupressure, and laser to assist healing for over 10 years. She also uses essential oils to enhance training and massage. Maxine assists people in learning ground work with their horses, equine stress control, and general horse keeping/partnership issues. She also assists in basic riding skills.

Maxine will demonstrate Equine Stress Control. It is a process that uses hand motions and tapping on the body to help horses to be in their thinking mind instead of their reactive or flight/fight mind. It is a variation of the process used on people for Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. Before the fearful situation is introduced, thehandler uses the full tapping protocol. Then the handler intriduces the stressful situation (barn sour issue, tarp, plastic bags, water, trailer loading.....), and when the horse shows a resistance or fear response, the handler taps further. Then, when the horse relaxes, it is allowed to retreat. The handler repeats this approach/retreat/tapping until the horse achieves a relaxed attitude with the situation. With a barn sour situation, this will be used over a course of days (depending upon the severity of the behavior) until overcome.

The rider can use this technique from the saddle as well. Maxine was able to rehab a very dangerous mare using this technique when nothing else I tried worked.

We are looking for a few volunteer horses for this presentation, preferably horses that currently have some fear issues that need to be dealt with.



Gilnocky Equestrian Center, 20242 W.C.R. 5, Berthoud, will host the May meeting. Here's how to get there:

Directions



From North, South, or East:

- Take I 25 to the Berthoud exit (Colorado 56).
- At the end of the exit ramp, turn west onto CO 56 toward Berthoud.
- Follow CO 56 about 2 miles to County Road (CR) 5.
- Turn left (south) onto CR 5.
- Follow CR 5 about 3/4 mile. Gilnocky Equestrian Center is on the left (east) side of the road.

From West or South:

- Take US 287 to Berthoud.
- On the east side of Berhoud, where US 287 makes a 90 degree curve toward Loveland, turn east onto Colorado 56.
- Follow CO 56 about 3 miles to County Road (CR) 5.
- Turn right (south) onto CR 5.
- Follow CR 5 about 3/4 mile. Gilnocky Equestrian Center is on the left (east) side of the road.

Note: Two driveways enter Gilnocky Equestrian Center. Use the second driveway, and then park in the small area between the arena and the road. If that area is full, follow the second driveway until you find a parking space near the back of the arena.

Read on for the annual invitation to the Forest Service Trail Maintenance Workshop, as well as opportunities to enhance your skills through classes offered by Volunteers for Outdoor Colorado.

Training Workshop

You're invited! Forest Service Trail Maintenance 101 in April

If you work on- or would like to work on- Forest Service trails as a volunteer, this training is for YOU!

Any healthy adult can perform all of the basic tasks needed for trail maintenance. Our goal for this two-part workshop is to give you the confidence and skills you need to properly maintain a US Forest Service trail- to whatever degree you can assist. By the time you complete the training, you'll be able to do these things:

- Demonstrate safety procedures for use, carry, and storage of hand tools used in trail maintenance.
- Demonstrate how to give a trail head safety session and complete required safety forms.
- Recognize unsafe tools and know when to stop using them.






