

About the Show

A Chorus Line is a celebration of the American Musical and of those unsung heroes of the Theatre: the chorus dancer. On Broadway, the chorus dancers are valiant, overdedicated, underpaid, highly trained performers who back up the star or stars and often make them look even more talented than they are.

Specifically, A Chorus Line takes the audience through the final grueling audition run by the director, Zach, for a new Broadway musical. This competition which might easily be the common denominator that grabs the audience and holds it by the collective heartstring until the final, ultimate choices are made. For everyone, at one time or another, puts his life "on the line." We all compete, no matter what business we're in, for promotion, for attention, for approval and for love.

A Chorus Line opened on Broadway October 19, 1975 and in 1984, it became the longest-running show in Broadway history, playing for 6,137 performances.

A Chorus Line won 9 Tony Awards, 5 Drama Desk Awards, 3 Obie Awards, and the Pulitzer Prize for Drama.
