Jim Weaver, K8JE, the ARRL
Division Chairman and John Meyer,
NB4K, the ARRL Kentucky Section
Manager were the invited speakers
for the evening. They discussed and
answered questions about the PRB1,
a bill to prevent restrictions against
antenna placement by amateur radio
operators and the new proposals
before the FCC to change the
licensing requirements for the different
amateur classes.

#### PRB1:

There are an ever increasing number of home owner associations and communities that are passing restrictions on antenna placement by amateur radio operators. The FCC has passed rulings that limit associations from these types of restrictions, but when tested in a Kentucky court of law, the FCC ruling was not upheld since it is a ruling and not law. Therefore a bill, PRB1, was introduced to the state legislature to limit antenna restrictions by such associations. During the course of deliberations, PRB1 was submitted to the Kentucky League of Cities for comment. The League of Cities sentiment was that the PRB1 bill was not necessary because the FCC already has a rule in place covering restrictions on ham antennas. Because the League is such a strong lobby, support for PRB1 was withdrawn and it is essentially dead. Therefore, we are back to square one.

#### FCC License Petition:

Following the International Communications Union's latest meeting, where they passed a ruling to drop the international code requirement for amateur licenses, several proposals were submitted to the FCC to alter the amateur licensing requirements within the US. Subsequently, the ARRL also drafted a petition to the FCC in which the 5 WPM code would only be required as a testing requirement for extra class. but not for the other license classes. The ARRL petition also proposed restructuring of the other license classes:

Creation of a "Novice" license to serve as an introductory class which would have UHF, VHF, and HF privileges including phone. Current Novice class license holders would then enjoy these expanded privileges. Current Tech, Tech Plus and General classes would be grandfathered into the new general class. Current Advanced and Extra classes would be grandfathered into the new extra class. Therefore, the five classes of current licenses would be rolled over into three classes. Along with the new license classes, a revised band plan for these classes on HF was also submitted as part of the petition.

#### **Surfin': Got Facts**

"Work DX? Want to know more about the countries of the DX stations you work? Then you need the facts that are available at this week's Surfin' Web site."

Are you a clueless DXer? You work Jabru to complete DXCC, but you have no clue about Jabru except that its great circle bearing is 47 degrees from your ham shack in downtown Podunk.

If you are curious and want to know more about those mysterious countries you work on 20 meters, you can ask Sam. That's "Sam" as in Uncle Sam and he runs a little operation out in Langley, Virginia, that can help you out.

Uncle Sam's little operation is called the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA, for short) and they publish <u>The World</u> <u>Factbook</u>, which contains loads of information about every country in the world except the Conjured Principality of Jabru.

Select a country from the menu on The World Factbook home page and the facts about that country appear in your web browser. The facts start with a picture of the country's flag, a map of the country, a little history about the country, then page after page of additional facts about the country. For example, I printed the facts about my grandparents' motherland, SP-land (Poland for those unfamiliar with call sign prefixes), and it filled over 10 pages of medium-sized Web browser text.



The facts in The World Factbook facts include the particulars about the geography, people, government, economy, communications, transportation, military, and transnational issues of each country. For example, did you know that Poland produces 17,180 barrels of oil per day (2001 estimate)? I didn't even know that there were oil wells in Poland!

The World Factbook is on-line or you can download it to your computer for faster access. You can also purchase a printed copy of the book, if you so desire. There is also a link to submit a "factual update" to the CIA.


