 Claire Rinehart KF4IWX Secretary/Treasurer Minutes & Sec/Tres Report By Claire Rinehart, KF4IWX Last month's meeting hosted Norm from the National Weather Service. He showed a video, "Turn Around, Don't Drown" which pointed out the risks that are taken in attempting to cross flooded areas. Bottom line – don't risk your life, find another way around flooded areas.

Norm then explained the basics in tornado spotting. The following contains a guide for estimating the type of information needed for reports of severe weather to the SKYWARN system 1-800-292-5588. This cal also be reported over the internet at

www.crh.noaa.gov/espotter/.

There is a Ham operator at NOAA in Louisville during severe weather. The Louisville NOAA frequency is 146.700. Since hail, rain, and wind often precede tornados and contribute to the danger of severeweather, learning to estimate these is helpful in reporting local conditions.

Funnel Cloud/Tornado

To be considered a tornado, sustained rotation in the clouds must be observed. Touching / Not touching the ground Location
Time of sighting
Direction of movement
General description

Hail Size

1/4" Pea size
1/2" Marble size
3/4" Dime size
1" Quarter size
1 3/4" Golfball
2 3/4" Baseball

Rain

Intensity (heavy, very heavy)
Flooding

Wind Speed Estimates (mph)

25-31 Large branches in motion; whistling heard in power lines. 32-38 Whole trees in motion: inconvenience felt walking against wind. 39-54 Twigs break off trees; wind generally impedes walking progress. 55-72 Damage to chimneys and TV antennas; pushes over shallow trees. 73-112 Peels surfaces off roads; windows broken; light trailer houses pushed or overturned: moving cars pushed off road. 113-157 Roofs torn off
