A special thank you goes out to Joe Grassia for getting us the show, not to mention the best audience I've seen at a S.Y.M. Show!

Also, a thank you goes out to the Marthinsen's who also contributed by letting us

use their home for the cast party after the show.

Last month, I wrote about modifying a trick to fit your needs.

One way of doing this is to simply create your own tricks. You might ask yourself how do I do that? Well, there are many different things I do to stimulate ideas, sometimes without even realizing it. My ways may not work for you, because I don't believe there is one set way of thinking. I think in many different directions, and I get distracted very easily from anything I am doing at the moment when I get a new idea.

I love it when ideas just pop into my head, it is a great feeling. I get very excited and start pacing around in circles, sometimes around the dinner table. Then, when I have that idea, I start exploring other ideas. I may find out five minutes later that the idea is not as good as I thought it was earlier. That may be a let down at the moment, but I don't care because there will be other ideas to come. I like the creative process just as much and sometimes more than performing magic.

When I have an idea, I usually like to tell it to someone else whose input I respect, so we can throw ideas around. My brother Doug, and Carman Dewees are two people I talk with to generate ideas. That second person can pose questions as to how the trick might work, or may even come up with an additional idea I wish I came up with.

One thing Doug and I did over the summer was we got lots of junk out of drawers and we each had to create a trick in five minutes with the stuff we had in front of us. That was more of a structured creative activity, one that I didn't like much.

Another way to get ideas is to play around with household objects and toys. For the past five days I have been playing around with an orange and a drinking straw.

It reminds me of those old Tropicana TM T.V. commercials, and I have thought up some cool ideas with it.

Other ways of creating, two of which I personally

don't like very much, are having a time constraint and denying yourself from using a particular magical object. For instance, this summer at the S.A.M. convention I promised myself that I would give up the use of a deck of cards... forever.

Well, it seemed like a good idea at the time, and I thought, after all there are so many other things to use in close-up without using cards, right? It didn't last very long, but now I think I still can do other

magic as well as cards.

The last thing I have to say is not to be afraid to fail. I have fallen on my face so many times that you could crack an egg on my forehead and the yolk wouldn't slide off. If you know me well enough, you'll agree. That's okay though, because everyone makes mistakes, and all I can do is laugh and learn from it. The phrase "what every happens, let it happen" that I learned from David Oliver's Minute-man course, I think is the most important and useful thing I have ever learned. It is the one thing a book or magic video can't teach you: how to recover from a mess-up.

When I mess up now, I don't even stop, I just do. I've messed up sooooo many times that messing up is second nature to me. There is no use or need for me to let the audience on to what happened. Take everything as a learning experience.

I think Walt Disney stated it pretty well when he said, "It is good to have a failure while you're young, because it teaches you so much. For one thing, it makes you aware that such a thing can happen to anybody, and once you've lived through the worst, you're never quite as vulnerable afterward" and "You may not realize it when it happens, but a kick in the teeth may be the best thing in the world for you."

Well, I'm back to school after a very nice spring break vacation and back to my usual routine of doing schoolwork until I fall asleep at the computer. So first let me apologize for getting a little behind in writing the articles each month. It seems to be that the deadlines for the BMW fall right in the middle of a week of tests and labs, but enough complaining and making excuses.

So lets jump right into everyone's favorite topic: the Masked Magician!!! He's an idiot.

Now that I've got that out of my system (as if we really need to hear more about the guy to begin with), I'd like to talk about something that many of you may come across: competitions. Magic camp is just around the corner and everyone who's there knows that the competitions are big part of learning magic. Now, I haven't been in any big competitions, but I've seen a bunch, and I've competed at magic camp every year that I've gone (5 years so far!). I'm sure we could go on and on about competitions, but for now I just thought I'd offer a few tips for those who plan on entering and are working on acts in hopes of winning the grand prizes!

1. Have fun! Don't make the competition into a big deal, just go out there and do your best. Its better to just relax and learn as much as you can, than to only be there for the sake of winning.

2. Compete for yourself, not for the purpose of beating someone or showing off. You'll be better off thinking about you well you do instead of how bad someone else does. What if you, or someone else, is just having a really bad day and it changes the results? Would it make you feel any better to win because someone was just having an off day? Besides, who wants to brag about a competition that's a total blowout?

3. Aim to entertain. It's just another show with the only difference being that there's a whole bunch of magicians watching you. Don't just try to do tricks that fool people, or really difficult sleight of hand. Worry about how good the act is and then add some knucklebusters later on.

4. Be able to laugh at your mistakes, especially during a magic competition. Now, nobody wants anything to go wrong, but sometimes it can't be helped. Other magicians will know what you're doing and may have had the same thing go wrong for them. Don't let them see how mad you are, just shrug it off or chuckle and they'll understand that it may have just been a freak thing that messed up. Then when you're done you can go off stage and complain all you want!

5. Take every loss as a lesson, and every win as a bonus. If you go into the competition with the right attitude, it doesn't

matter what place you come in. Most competitions have feedback sessions to get some input on your act. You'll get new ideas and they'll tell you if something was either way off or really good. The judges aren't out to hurt you, they're there to help. Take their advice and kick on the next one. If you win, there's an extra bonus, but it doesn't mean you're all done learning. There's always room for improvement and you always try to get more out of the competition than a trophy. For now this is the best non-technical advice that I can give you. Trust me, you'll be better off to go into a competition with a good attitude. I speak from experience, just ask anyone who's seen me compete. I've gone from taking competitions as a failure and doing poorly to seeing competitions as a place to have fun and doing well. I really think that the reason I won the last two competitions was because I didn't even plan on winning. I just wanted to go out and have a good time, which I definitely did! And winning was just the icing on the cake!

So that's it for now! Maybe next time I'll get into some of the technical things to expect with a competition and how to go about working on your act. So until then...

FROM THE NORTH

Take either Route 93 or the Mystic-Tobin Bridge to the Central Artery. The Central Artery becomes the Expressway South. Take the Expressway to the Kneeland Street exit. As you come out of the exit, you will be at a set of lights. Go through the lights (bearing slightly to the left) and drive one block to a second set of lights. Take a left at these lights (Kneeland Street). Go two blocks and take another left. This is South Street. We're on the left side of the street at number 127.

FROM THE SOUTH

Find your way to the Southeast Expressway (Route 3). Take the very last exit, marked Downtown-Chinatown. As you come off the exit ramp, you will be at a set of lights. Take a right at these lights, then your first left (you are now on South Street.) Go up South to number 127, on the left side of the street.

FROM THE WEST

Take the Massachusetts Turnpike to the very last exit marked Chinatown-Downtown Boston—Kneeland Street. As you come down the exit ramp, you will be at a set of traffic lights. Take a right at these lights (you are now on Kneeland Street). Take your second left off of Kneeland Street. You are now on South Street. We are on the left side of the street at number 127.


