Dr. Murphy is compelled by law when he finds something like this to report it to the authorities. Dr. Murph I think, has gone further than that. In his interest the case, he's -- he's a person who's disabled himsely He has artificial hips and so on. He's very, very concerned about medical ethics and these issues, and felt it was an extraordinarily horrific case, so he went into a lot of interest in this. But he wrote two very sane letters to Dr. Plunkett, and if we had an answer, I think I'm entitled to an answer from the medical examiner, a sound rational answer.

THE COURT: You know, I suppose the simples thing would be to call Dr. Plunkett and tell him he's under subpoena and tell him to come up here, otherwis he's in violation of the Court Order. But I can also say I want something productive. I'm not protecting anyone. Like I said, I want to get this thing over with. And at the same time, I want you to leave this courtroom satisfied you had your day in court.
