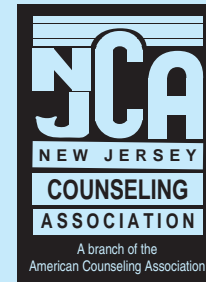

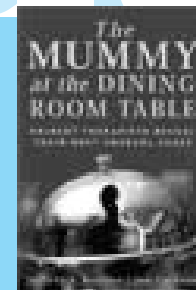

PRECONFERENCE WORKSHOP 1:00PM - 4:00PM

Jeffrey Kottler, Ph. D

"The Good, the Bad , & the Ugly: Seminal Cases of the World's Best Therapists." Based on a series of three books (Bad Therapy, The Mummy at the Dining Room Table, and The Finest Hour), the most prominent theoreticians were interviewed about their worst failures, most unusual cases and finest examples of work. After reviewing the most interesting and provocative narratives culled from the interviews, participants will explore their own seminal cases and learn ways to enhance their own professional work and personal growth. As difficult as it is to facilitate changes in counseling, the truly challenging part is how to make the changes last over time.

This unique psychospiritual approach employs psychodrama, spontaneous affirmation, prayer, art, and guided meditation. Soul drama enables people to discover their life's purpose by releasing emotional and mental blocks that inhibit psychospiritual growth.

Enhancing the Effectiveness of the Counseling Group: Screening for Membership

Jesse DeEsch, Ph.D.

The effectiveness of a counseling group, for any population, is directly related to the effectiveness of the screening session for admission to the group. The program will present the basic elements of effective screening, demonstrations of screening for the counseling group, and the participants will practice screening with one another.

Traumatized / Abused Children: Facts and Hope

Nancy Westberg, Ph.D., James Murphy, D.Ed., Stefan Domrowski, Ph.D

Child abuse, neglect, and trauma have been linked to mental disorders and behavior problems during childhood and in later life. Counselors need to be knowledgeable of the effects, treatment, and laws regarding child abuse and trauma. This session will cover an overview of mandated child-abuse reporting for counselors, the effects of childhood trauma/abuse/neglect on brain development and personality development, and strategies to help traumatized/ abused/ neglected children. This presentation will include viewing a videotape and audience participation.

Combating Counselor Burnout in School & Mental Health Settings

Paula Danzinger, Ph.D

Counselors deal with people in crisis, people in pain, and people who are suffering. Sometimes we can help, sometimes not. Often the result of our work is hard to define and see. This workshop will offer strategies to counselors to help them fight the feelings of frustration and to help them not take on the pain of their clients. This workshop will also define burnout and delineate methods of avoiding it.

The Wellness is Within

Deborah Hill, MFT and Alexis Mitchell, MA

This workshop is designed to highlight the health in families. Through the use of genograms and a Symbolic Interaction perspective, strengths in families are highlighted when patterns and themes are identified. This workshop will encourage counselors to map their own family as an introduction into implementing this concept into their respective therapeutic work.

ADHD: Assessment, Diagnosis and Treatment

George Kapalka, Ph.D.

This workshop will review the research on the etiology of ADHD, as well as common assessment methods that help mental health professionals clarify the diagnosis. Common co-morbid disorders will be discussed, as will be the so-called ADHD look-alikes. Research, including the presenters work, on effective ADHD treatments will be reviewed. An outline for treatment that has been identified as being effective in treating ADHD symptoms at home as well as at school will be discussed.

Developing a Nine-Session Career Counseling Program for your Private Practice or Agency

Beverly Baskin Ed.S, LPC & Mitchell Baskin, MMS, PE

This workshop will teach participants how to implement a nine-session program for their clients needing career counseling and coaching, as well as job search information. Topics include how to conduct counseling and testing, help with resume preparation, networking strategies and resources, preparing clients for interviews, researching jobs and recruiters for clients, and helping clients to find job opportunity on the World Wide Web.



Jeffrey A. Kottler received his Ph.D. in counseling psychology from the University of Virginia in 1977. Since that time he has been a faculty member in various institutions around the world, teaching extensively in Asia, Africa, Europe, Latin America, Australia, and New Zealand. Jeffrey has been a Fulbright Scholar in Peru, Iceland, and Thailand. He is currently Professor and Chair of the Counseling Department at California State University, Fullerton.

Jeffrey is the author of 50 books in the fields of counseling, psychology, and education that have been translated into more than a dozen languages. His best known works include *The Imperfect Therapist* (1989), *Compassionate Therapy: Working With Difficult Clients* (1992), *Advanced Group Leadership* (1993), *On Being a Therapist* (1993), *Beyond Blame: A New Way of Resolving Conflict in Relationships* (1994), *Growing a Therapist* (1995), *The Language of Tears* (1996), *What You Never Learned in Graduate School* (1997), *Travel That Can Change Your Life* (1997), *The Therapist's Workbook* (1998), *The Last Victim: Inside the Minds of Serial Killers* (1999), *Exploring and Treating Acquisitive Desire* (1999), *Doing Good: Passion and Commitment For Helping Others* (2000), *Making Changes Last* (2001), *Theories in Counseling and Therapy* (2002), *Bad Therapy: Master Therapists Share Their Worst Failures* (2003), and *The Mummy at the Dining Room Table* (2003).

A Cognitive Behavioral Approach to Faith & Spirituality

J. Calvin Chatlos, MD

A Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT) framework demonstrates the non-supernatural, person-centered source of the Faith Experience and its role in the healing process and professional growth. This group experience begins with the biologically based mental process of making distinctions, described by Piaget, and expands it beyond objects, relationships, and the morality to the integrated "mind" experiences of "Being". The focus will be on essential core experiences of human worth and dignity. Participants will be guided to recognize specific characteristics of spiritual experiences that include vitality, wholeness, connectedness, serenity, and meaning. Opportunities to identify professional and personal blocks of Faith are emphasized.

Psychopharmacology for Adults

Joseph Springer, Ph.D

This workshop will give a review of the more commonly prescribed psychotropic medications used with the adult population. This workshop offers a basic understanding of the hypothesized mechanisms of action with the major categories of psychiatric medications, indications for usage, common side effects and potential interactions with other commonly prescribed medications.

Becoming an Effective Counseling Supervisor: Legal, Ethical & Multicultural Issues

C. Emmanuel Ahia, Ph.D., J.D.

Participants of this workshop will learn the legal, ethical and multicultural dimension of being a counseling supervisor. Issues related to theoretical orientation, documentation, informed consent, boundary violations, certification, video/audio taping issues, peer and contextual supervision will be discussed. A fairly comprehensive bibliography on counseling supervision will be distributed to participants.

A brief attachment questionnaire will be completed putting the participant in touch with their attachment style. Theory, historical constructs and current applications will be reviewed. Small group discussions will include how participants can include attachment as a therapeutic tool.

Pediatric Psychopharmacology: Current Research and Best Practices

This workshop will review the psychopharmacological approaches to the treatment of common childhood disorders. Research on the pharmacological treatments of ADHD, Tourette's, Mood Disorders and Anxiety Disorders will be examined and common medications for the Treatment of these disorders will be discussed. The workshop will also review the basics of pharmacokinetics and pharmacodynamics, with particular emphasis of how these processes occur in children.

The Inspire Program is a character education program based on principles of self-control, perseverance, integrity, responsibility and excellence. This program gives at-risk students alternative methods to conceptualize conflict, express differences and solve problems. It gives them access to the language of non-violent confrontation, as well as being able to view conflict as a process with multiple potential outcomes.

Counseling the Bi-Sexual Community

Studies have found that bisexuals experience more negative reactions from family and friends, greater degrees of heterosexual bias, prejudice from the lesbian and gay community, and have higher scores for depression/ anxiety than lesbians or gay men. This workshop will explore the myths and truths about bisexuality, examine the concept of sexual orientations, and discuss clinical issues of bisexual clients and how to be a better counselor to this population.
