"But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." Matthew 6:33 NIV

Sometime I was talking with someone who lived in the Deep South, and the conversation turned to summer. Now down south the summers are brutal, hot and humid. By and large people stay inside, and it is difficult to do much of anything until fall. When we read those familiar words from Matthew's gospel, notice Jesus doesn't spell out what "all these things" are.

I suspect that we could go so far as to include all the wonderful activities we partake of in the summer.

We recently returned from short trip to visit my wife's family in Indiana. Knowing that the time was limited I prayed for God to work out the opportunities. Not only did our goal come to pass, but we visited twice with a family member we hadn't seen in number of years.

One of things we tend to do is to compartmentalize our faith. Obviously, it is front and center at worship or at life's challenging or difficult moments. But as God is with us 24/7, and our baptism makes us God's children 24/7, shouldn't we seek God on a basis striving for a walk with God that includes all aspects of our life 24/7?

What is one area of your life you haven't given over to God, or haven't thought about seeking God's guidance for?

God really does want good for all of us. While seeking God's help in vacation planning maybe one way bringing God into everyday life, I'm sure that there are others. "Seek first" says Jesus. May we do so early and often!
