

The Pastor's Letter

"......I was a stranger and you invited me in." Matthew 25:35c NIV

Dear Friends.



A few weeks ago, when we were visiting Pam's family in Indiana, we were there on a weekend, so we looked for a church to worship at. First we had to find one. That took a bit of doing, but we did find an ELCA church just down the road. Even though I am a pastor, when I worship someplace else outside my congregation I have a lot of anxiety.

You would think I'd never been in church before!

Yet I imagine that my anxiety is not too different from those who might be visiting our church for the first time. My first concern was; where do I go in? That seems obvious, but it really wasn't, and even though the church building was not that big, I wasn't sure.

When we got to the sanctuary there were ushers at the entrance, but they seemed more like a barrier than a help. One did take the time to greet us and ask our names. The whole service was projected at the front of the chancel, but it was still confusing. When worship was over, they had a fellowship time after worship, but nobody invited us.

After we left I mentioned to Pam that there was something I didn't like about that congregation, and when we came back that way we'd worship somewhere else.

So after being on the "other side" of worship, it made me think; how do we welcome the strangers in our midst? Do we take the time to greet them? If we're sitting near, do we make sure they can follow along in worship? We have a very nice fellowship hour in Ed Frey hall; do we invite visitors to spend some time with us? When visitors see ushers at the door, do they feel welcomed, or do they feel like they have just run into the defensive line of the Jets?

Visitors come to our church for a variety of reasons. Maybe it's because they're in town for the weekend. Maybe they are here because they're part of one of the regular families at our church. Maybe they are here because they are going through a life crisis. Maybe they are here because of a possible wedding or baptism. They may just be passing through to another place to visit family, but they saw our church on 22.

Whatever the reason we want them to feel glad they are with us, and that they are able to worship God with us. Hospitality is so important to our faith that Jesus proclaims that "I was a stranger and you invited me in" when talking about the final judgment.

All of us don't have to do everything, but all of us can do something to make sure whoever comes through our door is welcomed, and can worship with us, especially during the summer season. While we are thankful for those who do this already, it is a good reminder of how important it is to "invite in the stranger" You never know who you might be welcoming, it could even be a Lutheran pastor from another area on vacation........

The Muhlenberg Tercentenary

We are a Muhlenberg church! Henry Melchior Muhlenberg (1711-1787), the first "pastor-



bishop" of the Lutheran church in this country had a direct hand in strengthening and helping our church in its early days in the 1750's and 60's. Muhlenberg came here from Germany as a "missionary" to German Lutherans in the new world. Eventually he took the lead in organizing and strengthening the colonial

Lutheran church, leaving his mark on churches in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York, Delaware, Maryland, North and South Carolina, Georgia, and Virginia!

Being a missionary to the New World in those days was no glamorous task. Life was rugged in the new world for a whole host of reasons. The other challenge was the plight of the German Lutherans themselves. They, for the most part, were very poor, getting their land as "indentured servants", working for a wealthy landowner rather than themselves until they could pay off the debt for the land. If you read the article in the hallway next to Frey Hall, and leading to the church office, it mentions an excerpt from Muhlenberg's journal (he kept extensive, descriptive journals about most of his activities) about his visit to the "straw church" in 1751! He visited them to help in their struggle to organize the church. Apparently he communed about 27 people that day, and was struck by their poverty!

No doubt he had a hand in our congregation later when his son Peter Muhlenberg became the first ordained pastor here (1770-72).

This year is the 300th anniversary of Muhlenberg's birth. The Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia is spearheading some of the programs and celebrations marking this very special event. I was asked to be the representative from the New Jersey Synod on the committee that is overseeing these programs and celebrations.

On September 6th (the actual day of Muhlenberg's birth) at the seminary there will be various workshops as well a keynote address by Martin Marty, historian, Lutheran, and well known speaker on the American religious scene. On October 15th there will be a day for congregations at the seminary. As a lasting legacy to Muhlenberg's work a student scholarship is being started at the seminary.

I am excited to be part of the committee, and we at St. James can be proud of our link to this "father" of the Lutheran church in this country. More importantly to me, Henry Melchior Muhlenberg loved the Lord, and telling the good news of the gospel. Perhaps that was the secret to all of his hard work, and efforts on behalf of the church.

I will be giving out more information about the 300^{th} Anniversary celebrations, and hope some of you will be able to attend with me.
