

The Pastor's Letter

Dr. George Sweeting tells of an incident in the early 1920s when Communist leader Nikolai Bukharin was sent from Moscow to Kiev to address an anti-God rally. For an hour he abused and ridiculed the Christian faith until it seemed the whole structure of belief was in ruins. Then questions were invited.

An Orthodox Church priest rose and asked to speak. He turned, faced the people, and gave the Easter greeting, "He is risen!" Instantly the assembly rose to its feet and the reply came back loud and clear, "He is risen indeed!" (Today in the Word, September 1989, p. 8)

While we are still in Lent, and Easter is near perhaps it is good to remember why we take this journey to the cross - because it always leads us to the power and victory of Jesus' resurrection. For over two thousand years believers have defiantly proclaimed Jesus rising from the dead despite anything and everything that has been put forth to destroy that belief. Dr. Sweeting's powerful illustration above makes it abundantly clear.

The challenge for us in the year 2013 is as follows: can we still be a people rooted in the resurrection of Jesus Christ? This is no easy question to answer, because if you follow it through in the reality of life or the church, or world, we may assent to it in our heads, but we don't follow through in the actions of our lives.

I know I have been just as guilty of that as anyone. There have been times I felt God has promised me something special, and just because it didn't happen on my time table or the process became difficult I wanted to "bail out" or, like the children of Israel in the desert, complain. It was at times like that I will always be grateful for those who put up with me and pushed me forward to trust God despite what I thought I was seeing or thinking.

Through my work especially in the "wider" church these last five years I have to say I hear a lot of "panic" amongst church members in various churches who are in "panic mode" because they are worried that their church might run out of money and close. I might add too, in their distress these folks long for the "good old days" when many more people attended church.

While of all of this is completely understandable, we forget that the power of the church was not formed by an easy path to success, it formed with the wood of the cross and that defiant proclamation of the Resurrected Christ. In fact you might say the church grew even though many were willing to and did die for their faith.

God has a path for you and me. God has claimed us in our baptism, and somewhere along the line in life we affirmed that Jesus Christ was our savior and Lord in Confirmation, or that affirmation became even more real and vital through a later experience in our lives. That does not mean our journey or the journey of the church will be easy, or things will always go the way WE think they should.

So it comes down to this question, are we people of the resurrection or not? With two thousand years of the testimony of history behind us let us live as people of the resurrection. When you think about it, we wouldn't be here today if others before us didn't believe it.

May this Easter we not only celebrate it as the victory of our faith, but as the power to meet the challenges of our lives and of the church.



New Jersey Synod Assembly June 6th – 8th Election of a New Bishop

When our current bishop, Bishop Roy Riley was elected about 21 years ago, the ELCA was only a few years old. Computer technology was just starting to gain public appeal. Cell phones were very large and rare! Many major industries that employed many people were still in business, the threat of foreign terrorism was not at the forefront, because it seemed like it was something that happened in other countries, not ours. "Hot Button" social issues that eventually would divide the church were beginning to pick up steam. Church attendance though waning from the high levels of the fifties was still somewhat strong. All of that has changed and more!

Now Bishop Riley is going to retire, and for the first time in 21 years we will be electing a different bishop! In the Greek language there are two words for time, "chronos" which means "regular" time, and "karios" which means a "special" time. This is CLEARLY a "karios" time in the life of our synod.


The synod has appointed a transition team, and I have already moderated a meeting of the Western District as dean where the whole question of electing a new bishop was a major topic of discussion. We at St. James will have a stake in the election by our sending two voting members to the assembly to elect a new bishop. I have already heard from several of you expressing interest. We are eligible to send two voting members, one male and one female. However if we do not have two opposite gender voting members, we can still send two voting members of the same gender. The registration deadline for the assembly is about April 20th.

The assembly will be held at the Hilton Hotel in New Brunswick. Because of our budget limitations, registration will be paid, but lodging will not for our two lay voting members.

Both as a rostered voting member and district dean I will be staying at the hotel for the whole meeting.

For those who have expressed an interest please let me know if you definitely want to go. For all of us at St. James I cannot stress enough that we should be in prayer for the Holy Spirit's guidance in this significant election of a new bishop in the New Jersey Synod.

May 19 - Crop Walk


A Laser Tag Day and more group meetings are also planned. This spring we will be painting our youth room, and are asking if anyone has a couch to donate for the room.

Of Historic Interest

We at St. James have a unique and valuable history, not only in the length of time the congregation has existed, but also in the architectural gem we have for a sanctuary and the amount of area and national history that lies in our cemetery. Recognizing this, Council has formed a Historic Committee to document and preserve the records of our past. As items of interest are uncovered, we will from time to time share them in these pages. In the near future, a large glass-fronted cabinet housing some of our treasures will be installed in Frey Hall.

Below are two receipts from the actual construction of our sanctuary building in 1834 - 35. The first one shows that the building cornerstone cost \$10.00, a tidy sum in those days!

STORIES OF FAITH IN ACTION



When an attempted robbery ended in a police shootout in Superior, Wis., faith leaders in the area decided to organize a prayer vigil inviting residents of the city to come and pray.

"We've drawn a line in the sand when it comes to community violence," says Patrick Ziems, pastor of Zion Lutheran Church, an ELCA congregation in Superior.

In 2012, Zion took a second look at the way it engages with its community, thanks to a program called Beyond Our Doors — an initiative of the ELCA Northwest Synod of Wisconsin that was sparked by decisions made on recommendations of the ELCA's Living into the Future Together task force at the 2011 ELCA Churchwide Assembly. A primary goal is to make

support for the work of congregations one of the highest priorities of this church and to request congregations, in collaboration with synods, to begin, develop, review or redefine their unique mission plans by the end of 2012.

Patrick says he used the program as an opportunity to reflect upon the relationships he had already established in his community, and he realized

in his community, and he realized that it would serve Superior best for Zion to continue partnering with other congregations and organizations to make a difference in their community.
