

The Hunt for the Risen Christ Game
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The resurrection of Christ has become the basis of the Christian faith and yet it was only the beginning of the fulfillment of God's promise to us. There were many citings of the risen Lord that brought hope and joy to the apostles during their period of hiding. Then with the full manifestation of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles at Pentecost, fear ended and the Church began. This is the reason why Easter should be celebrated as an eight-week holiday beginning from Easter week until Pentecost. The world, however, dictates that this celebration should be for one day and also have something for children to partake since they can not understand the depth of the meaning of this wondrous feast. This stagnant "celebration" is one of the reasons for this game. It will help pull this holiday season together for the children and the children in the eyes of God.

"The Hunt for the Risen Christ Game" is meant to be to Easter, as the Christmas tree and nativity scenes are to Christmas. They are symbols to help us focus and reflect upon the reason for the season. You should find the design of the game helpful in getting children to better understand the events that occurred two thousand years ago, by reenacting what happened through the eyes of the apostles.

Preparing to play the game:

There are some things you will need to do before Easter to prepare for this game, although they are not very difficult, it is always good to be prepared.

To begin, you will need to take an egg, hollow it out, and then decorate it. If you want to use this egg for Good Friday as well as Easter, decorate it with the image of the tomb on one side and the cross on the other side. The early Christians adopted the egg as a symbol of Easter from northern pagans who viewed the egg as a rock from which life sprung. Since Christ came alive from the tomb, they felt it was a good analogy. Keep this in mind as you decorate your egg.

Next, you will need to make (or cut out) several characters. These include an angel, Jesus, Mary Magdalene and the apostles. Also, you may wish to write a few scriptural quotes and place them at key places with the characters, though this is not necessary, it can enhance the story and game. Some quotes you may wish to use are:

Another way to enhance the game is by having a basket filled with perfumed oils and sweet spices such as parsley, ginger and cinnamon. This prop will give a good picture of the basket that was carried to the tomb to anoint the body of Jesus.

Finally, you will need to prepare your "game board". We like using our refrigerator as a board. We took the different characters and cemented them to flexible magnetic sheets. Then we cut them out and put them upon the refrigerator so everyone can reach and participate. You may wish to use some background for your board. One idea is to cut out some construction paper or possibly use a large piece of paper that the children can draw and color the scenes upon. You can use one background all

throughout the weeks of Easter or change it weekly to reflect the activities or Scriptural passages of that particular week. Let your own creativity work for you as you prepare and celebrate throughout the weeks.

Now there are a couple of remaining items that you may need. One is a cloud for Jesus to ascend upon; the other would be a dove and small tongues of fire to place over the heads of the apostles on Pentecost.

Once you have your background done, place all the apostles who are not on the initial hunt in the "upper room":

Andrew and James, the sons of Zebedee Philip
Bartholomew
Thomas
Matthew
James, the son of Alphaeus
Thaddaeus
Simon the Cananaean.

Don't forget to leave some room on the board for the other characters used in the hunt, and then add them as they are found. Jesus should be placed upon a cloud so He can ascend as the weeks pass.

During those passing weeks try to have some type of treats available, whether it is candy, fruit or a special time together. You know what your family will appreciate and enjoy, so make your choices based upon that fact. Through this we do believe they will also come to appreciate your efforts to make their celebration of Jesus' resurrection fun and memorable. To help you we have listed below the weeks that follow that glorious morning so you can think of some creative ideas. We also have included at the end of each week, a suggested activity for different age groups. Some of those activities can be found in the back portion of the book. Although this may seem like a lot of work, you will find it to be enjoyable and easy, especially if it becomes a family project.

- 1) Lk 24:13-33 Luke and Cle'opas on the way to Emma'us.
- 2) Jn 20:19-23 Christ appears to ten of the remaining disciples.
- 3) Jn 20:24-29 Christ appears to Thomas and the others.
- 4) Mt 28:16-20 Jesus appears to Eleven on a mountain in Galilee
- 5) Jn 21 Sea of Tiberias
- 6) Acts 1:1-14 Ascension of our Lord
- 7) Acts 1:15-17,21-26 Judas Iscariot is replaced.
- 8) Acts 2 Pentecost

Playing the Game:

How you begin the game depends on when you plan to start. We usually begin on Good Friday by placing the decorated egg with the cross side shown in a prominent place around 9:00 in the morning. Then some time between 4:00 p.m. to sundown, the egg should be turned and the tomb displayed. Eventually most children will see the images and ask why they are there. This gives us an opportunity to discuss the Lord's Passion with them.

On Easter you want to break or cut open the egg and put it out where it can be easily seen. Place the angel and the quote from Matthew in the broken egg. Next, carry the basket of oils and spices as you pretend to be one of the women going to the tomb. When you get there, read the quote of the angel spoken to Mary Mag'delene.

Now the hunt begins. Hide Peter, John, Mary and Jesus around the room or house and have the children search for them. You can have treats with each of these or pass them out according to which character(s) they find. For example, you can have a hollow chocolate egg with white filling with Peter and John to represent the empty tomb with the white shroud. And for Mary, there can be a chocolate lamb since she was the first to find Jesus. Peter can also have a chocolate lamb because he also saw Jesus later in the day. To promote questions or discussions, you may wish to include more Scripture quotes or paraphrased events with each of them, such as Mary saying, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him . . . " (John.20:15). Then you can ask the children, "To whom was she speaking and where did she think Jesus had gone?"

Read John 20:1-18 after all the pieces are found, or before the game begins is also appropriate. You may desire to have an even longer hunt by also hiding Christ, or you can place Him on the cloud after all the hidden characters are found.

There are many ways to modify this game to fit your particular needs, however, it is important to remember this game will be played for the remainder of the Easter season. You will want the whole family to keep their interest, especially yours, since you are the one who will determine the success by your participation. With this in mind, please use the following activities to guide you or even to spark your own creative ideas.

Week 1:

Luke and Cle'opas on the way to Emma'us

On the same day Jesus rose from the dead, two disciples were on the way to a resort town called Emma'us. They were talking about the events of the last few days as well as the strange tale the women had brought back from the tomb where Jesus had been laid. As they talked, Jesus joined them, but they didn't recognize him. "What are you talking about?" Jesus asked. "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?" answered Cle'opas (one of the two). "What things?" asked Jesus. Then the disciples told Jesus about all the events that had happened. "O foolish men, and slow of heart to believe . . . wasn't it necessary that Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" With this he began to interpret for them all the Hebrew Scriptures from Moses to that present time about himself.

It was getting near evening when they approached the village. Jesus seemed to be going on so they asked him to stay with them and he agreed. They invited him to supper, and as they sat down to eat he took bread and blessed it. It was during the blessing they recognized him and then he disappeared before their eyes. "Did not our hearts burn within us while he talked to us, while he opened to us the Scriptures?" They got up and hurried back to Jerusalem to tell the other disciples what had happened.

Verse: Lk 24:13-33

Reflection: As Alfred Edersheim, MA Oxon, DD, Ph.D. remarks in <u>The Life and Times of Jesus The Messiah</u>, we are often like these poor travelers, unaware that Christ walks beside us, feeling sadness due to our ignorance and faithlessness. In our travels throughout our lives, we often need someone to knock us out of our melancholy and tell us to stand in faith, as Christ stated here. The facts we have are limited, but the truth is deeper. Too often we get tripped up on incomplete information and improper understanding. But like those two travelers on their way to Emma'us we need only turn to the one who travels beside us and seek his guidance in faith.

Sug. Activities: Two mazes can be found in the activity section. Tell the children that Emma'us was a resort town, a place of rest and this is why the two disciples went there that day. Also tell them they must meet someone if they want peace and rest just as these two did. By the end of the puzzle they should know who they must meet in life. We also have a crossword puzzle for older children. We chose scriptures from the Hebrew Scriptures that foretold Jesus first coming, most of which are familiar though not all. The answers can be derived without the use of a Bible. We did this because everyone's Bibles are a little different.

Week 2

Christ Appears to Ten of the Remaining Disciples

On the evening of the first day, the disciples were together in the upper room with the door locked when Jesus came to them. "Peace be with you," he said. He then showed them his hands and side to show them he was real and not a ghost. The disciples were glad to see him. Again he said, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, even so I send you." After this he breathed on them saying, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive sins of any, they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

Verse: Jn 20:19-23

Reflection: If the Holy Spirit descended on Pentecost, what happened here? Christ breathed on "them", to receive the Holy Spirit. In a sense he was breathing life into the church. It is the actual birth of the church, and Pentecost is the commissioning or baptism. (*Note:* the right to forgive or retain sins is also granted to the church).

Another interesting note; although in the English language the two words sent and send have the same meaning, just differ in tense, this isn't true for Greek. In Greek the two words have very different meanings. Christ was *apostello* or sent forth as to service or with a commission. The disciples on the other hand were *tempo* or sent in the sense of being dispatched. In other words, Christ had the commission, we just bring the message.

Sug. Activities: There is a word search in the puzzle section. It describes qualities of Christ that we also should possess because Jesus has sent us on a mission and we need to realize we are representatives for Him. Therefore our words or actions should not be our own, but from the authority from which it came - Christ. For example, we know that the parents are ultimately responsible for the behavior of their child(ren). The lessons we give lead to two forms of discipline, one is parental and the other is self-discipline. The parental discipline would be as an example, "Do not jump on the bed!" Eventually we want our children to be self-disciplined to refrain from jumping, or if necessary to say to a sibling, "Mom said not to jump on the bed!" It is the relay of the original message that brings the point home, not the authority of the child speaking.

Week 3

Christ Appears to Thomas and the Others

Thomas was not with the disciples when Christ came that first evening and he didn't believe them when they insisted that they saw Jesus. "Unless I see in his hands the print of the nails, and place my finger in the mark of the nails, and place my hands in his side, I will not believe." A week later Christ came again. "Peace be with you", he said. Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here, and see my hands; and put out your hand, and place it in my side; do not be faithless, but believing." Then Thomas answered, "My Lord and My God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe."

Verse: Jn 20:24-29

Reflection: Thomas' words, "Unless... place my finger in the mark of the nails..." suggests that he did believe his friends had seen Christ, but only as a spirit or ghost. In our present age, we have heard many theories of different beliefs of this citing, however, it is important to know that the truth still remains - Christ was resurrected (not resuscitated) when He rose as flesh and blood, not as a ghost.

Truly, blessed are those who do not see, as Thomas has, and yet believes in the testimony for they shall have life with Him.

Sug. Activities: Today's story about Thomas deals with the issue of trust. Thomas' friends had told him Christ was alive, but despite the fact that his friends were generally trustworthy, Thomas found it impossible to believe them entirely. We generally are hard on Thomas' disbelief, but the following activity can show anyone participating that they also can have problems with trust:

You need at least two people, one to catch and one to fall back. The person who will fall stands with their hands folded against their body, their eyes closed and <u>fully</u> relaxed. When they are ready, they are to fall into the hands of the person who is to catch them. The person catching should be an adult and someone the falling person trusts. The person falling should never be pressured to fall if they don't want to. If you are afraid of someone taking too much time, set a time limit and if they don't fall by that time they have proven their lack of trust already. Even when they do fall, most people don't trust those whom they should. You'll see their lack of full trust by how they tighten up and not relax. Just as Thomas could not fully trust his friends, we too find it hard to trust.

Week 4

Jesus Appears to Eleven on a Mountain in Galilee

The disciples went to Galilee as Christ had directed them through the women who saw him that first day. While they were there Christ came. Some believed in Him but some doubted. He said, "All authority in heaven and on earth, has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit, teaching them of observing all that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, to the close of the age."

Verse: Mt. 28:16-20, 1 Cor.15.6

Reflection: Compare Dan.7.14 to better understand Christ's words here. It is interesting how some could doubt the risen Christ even though they had seen Him. The answer may be in the testimony of Saint Paul to the Corinthians, 1 Cor.15.6. Here Paul states that more than five hundred people saw him there. With such great numbers, it's more than likely not all saw him up close. But even if they had, some people will hold onto their own false beliefs even in the face of irrefutable facts.

The Christians of two centuries ago often approached the Rabbis and their students to ask questions. They often were turned away with inadequate replies which failed to satisfy the students. For example the Midrash Rabat tells of the following conversation:

R.Samlai (third century) was asked: How many Divinities participated in the creation of the universe? He answered, we should inquire from the ancient days as it is

written in Deuteronomy 4:32: "For ask now of the days that are past, which were before thee, since the day that God created man upon the earth. . ." It is not written created in a plural Hebrew form, but in a singular form. He was asked further, why is it written *Bereshit bara elohim?* (Elohim is a plural form of God in Hebrew). He answered again, that *bara* (created) is a singular form.

Notice how the Rabbi never answers why we have plural form of God, *Elohim*, with the singular creation *bara*. We often see what we are willing to accept and disregard the rest. All of us share in this guilt which clouds our sight of truth. May the Lord who cleared the vision of Luke and Cle'opas so long ago clear ours as well.

Sug. Activities: A Christogram can be found in the activity section. For younger children there is a word maze. It is full of truths but only one truth leads to the gatekeeper and eternal life.

Week 5

Sea of Tiberias

Simon Peter, Thomas the Twin, Nathan'a-el of Cana, the sons of Zeb'edee and two others were by the Sea of Tiber'ri-as when Peter said that he was going fishing. They agreed to join him in his boat but caught nothing all night. Just as the dawn broke they saw a man on the shore. He was Jesus, but they didn't recognize him. "Children," he said, "Have you any fish?" They answered "No." Then he told them to drop the net to the right side of the boat and they would find some. They did as he said and caught so many fish they could not haul them into the boat. That's when the disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" Hearing this, Peter jumped into the sea to go to Him while the others followed in the boat.

When they reached land they saw that Christ had made a fire. Jesus said, "Bring some fish of the fish that you have caught." So Peter hauled the untorn net to shore. Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." No one dared to ask who he was for they knew it was Jesus.

After they finished breakfast Jesus said to Peter, "Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?" Peter answered, "Yes Lord; You know that I love you." Jesus said to him "Feed my lambs." A second time he said, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Peter said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Christ said, "Tend my sheep." Jesus said to him, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Peter was sad because he said this three times. He said, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep." ("Truly, truly, I say to you, when you were young, you girded yourself and walked where you would; but when you are old, you will stretch

out your hands and another will gird you and carry you where you do not wish to go." Then he said, "Follow me.")

Verse: Jn. 21

Reflection: Most people already know that Christ asked Peter three times if he loved him because Peter denied him three times. But only a few know that Christ used different words for love in the three questions. In the first two questions he said *agape* or an unselfish love such as Paul speaks of in 1 Cor.13.4-7. But each time Peter answers, he answers *Phileo*, a love which is a tender feeling; the kind of love you usually find in love songs. The third time Christ uses *Phileo* love, like Peter originally thought.

Christ said twice to feed his sheep and once he said tend my sheep. So why the double emphasis? The double emphasis shows a greater importance. In the first emphasis (love), we know it is important to revere Christ, however, it's still more important to put that love into action. In the second instance, to feed is to nourish with the word of God to the sheep who know his voice (believers). To tend means to care for, discipline, and give material assistance to His lambs, or young believers. Therefore we need to stress the Word and do so in love (as in Cor.), yet not forget the needs of those whom we teach.

Sug. Activities: In the activity section, there is a large catch of fish that need to be sorted. Follow the directions to sort and you'll find a message for us all.

Week 6

Ascension of our Lord

Jesus appeared to them for forty days and told them to stay in Jerusalem until the promise of the Holy Spirit came. When they were together Jesus appeared to them and they asked him if he was going to restore Israel. He said to them, "It is not for you to know times or seasons which the Father has fixed by his own authority. But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Sama'ria and to the end of the earth." And while they were looking at him Jesus was lifted up into a cloud, out of their sight. While they gazed up into the clouds two men in white robes appeared and said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking into heaven? This Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven." Then they returned to the upper room.

Verse: Acts 1:1-14

Reflection: The disciples know the scriptures and they realize that their Messiah came, but now they

wanted the restoration of Israel. *Why?* To answer this question, we need to go back to the two popular interpretations of the Messiah. The first was that the suffering and the reigning Messiah were one in the same; the other was that there were two Messiahs- a suffering Messiah (called Messiah Ben Joseph by rabbinical tradition) and a conquering Messiah (Messiah Ben David by tradition). When Christ was about to leave before the apostles, they were seeking for Jesus to now reign and fulfill all of scripture, but we now know that it wasn't time to do so. We clearly know that Jesus will come again to conquer and reign, but notice the irony of the interpretation of the two Messiahs:

Joseph was the son of Israel (Jacob) that was rejected by his brothers and sold into the Gentile world (Egypt). He then became the most powerful man of Egypt, second only to Pharaoh (who was considered a god by the Egyptians). There were seven (perfect) years of plenty and then seven years of famine. During the years of famine, his brothers returned to Joseph, but yet did not recognize him. It was only after trials and the bringing of Benjamin did Joseph reveal himself to them and reunited the family. Now doesn't this sound like Jesus who already came, who suffered, died and was buried and on the third day rose. All this has been fulfilled except for revealing Himself to His brothers (Israel) which will lead to the Messiah prophecies under Messiah Ben David.

David is the king who conquered all nations that threatened Israel, during Saul's reign as well as his own. He was the supreme ruler who found favor with God and was promised that a descendant would come and reign forever without any end. This descendant we know as Jesus the Christ will conquer all enemies of Israel and He will reign over Israel and bring all true believers to himself and they shall be one.

As we can see, the rabbis with the two Messiah interpretations are not that far off, they just need to be led by love and understanding that it is Jesus who does both.

Note: The Israel of scripture is not a new Israel. Israel is the twelve tribes plus all those grafted into the nation through faith in the Messiah.

Sug. Activities: There are three activities given to emphasize Christ's Second Coming. The first is for the very young to color, the second is for the intermediate ages to color and cut out as a puzzle. The third is geared to challenge the more experienced "child".

Week 7

Judas Iscariot is Replaced

In those days Peter stood up before the disciples (about 120 persons) and said that the disciples had to replace Judas who betrayed Christ and died. He then quoted a Psalm that spoke of Judas saying that the Psalm said that another should take his place. They only looked at persons who had been with them from the beginning and who had also seen the resurrection. In the end they choose two men:

Joseph called Barsab'bas who was surnamed Justus, and Matthi'as. They then prayed to the Lord and said, "Lord, you who know the hearts of all men, show which one of these two thou hast chosen to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside, to go to his own place." And they cast lots for them and the lot fell on Matthi'as; and he was enrolled with the eleven apostles.

Verse: Acts 1:15-17,21-26

Reflection: Casting lots is to throw small pieces of wood or stone into a cloth, shake it, and then draw one out. In this case there were two lots, one with Justus' name and the second Matthi'as. They sought the Lord in prayer earnestly seeking His way. The casting of the lots was to merely to make His way plain.

Does the casting of lots condone gambling? *Of course not!* Here the casting of lots is to make clear the Lord's will, not to win something. There is nothing wrong in finding ways for God to speak to us. We can speak to God through our prayers and actions, but we need to find the way to which we can understand God. This is vital if we truly desire to do according to God's will, not in labeling our will as God's. For any relationship to survive you need to communicate, but it needs to be from all sides. Finding the way to which God speaks to us is equally important. For the disciples this meant prayer and casting lots.

Sug. Activities: Your children can have a mock election to chose between two boxes with unknown contents. Put a picture of one of the two disciples, Justus or Matthi'as, on each box to give an impression of the election taking place. They should pray for wisdom before starting and what is not chosen you can give to charity. Place the winning disciple back with the other eleven on the board game and the children get to keep this box.

Week 8

Pentecost

When Pentecost came, the apostles were together when a great wind came upon them and filled the house. And there appeared on them tongues of fire, which rested on each one of them. Then they were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in tongues (Jews from around the known world traveled to Jerusalem at this time because it was a holy time). When the multitude came together, they heard the apostles speaking in their own native language. This amazed them and filled them with wonder. "What does this mean?" they asked puzzled. Then some supposing they were drunk said, "They are full of new wine."

Then Peter lifted up his voice above the others and addressed the crowd, "Men of Israel, here these words: Jesus of Nazareth, a man attested to you by God with mighty works and wonders and signs which God did through him in your midst, as you yourselves know- this Jesus, delivered up

according to the definite plan and foreknowledge of God, you crucified and killed by the hands of lawless men. But God raised him up, having loosed the pangs of death, because it was not possible for him to be held by it . . . This Jesus God raised up, and of that we all are witnesses. Being therefore exalted at the right hand of God, and having received from the Father the promise of the Holy Spirit, he has poured out this which you see and hear . . . Let all the house of Israel therefore know assuredly that God has made him both Lord and Christ, this Jesus whom you crucified." Now when they heard this they were very sad and they asked Peter and the apostles what they should do. Peter said to them, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins; and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit."

Verse: Acts 2

Reflection: This multitude in Jerusalem was true believing Jews, they had come before the Lord for the second of the three pilgrimages according to the Law of Moses. It was Shavout, the day they celebrated the giving of the Torah. But what happened that day was greater than what had happened on Mount Sinai. On Mount Sinai God gave the Torah to Moses to be presented to all of Israel. Here on Pentecost, God gave us His Spirit, the Holy Spirit which holds the Law in our hearts, to be presented to all who will believe and call on His name.

When we confess our sins, repent from our wicked ways and become baptized in the name of the Lord, we are open to receive the Holy Spirit. It doesn't matter at what age you make all these steps, but it does matter on your sincerity and obedience to God. Once the Holy Spirit dwells in you, you should be a new person. A person who relies upon the Lord to do all things, with a relationship that is personal between you and the Lord. Too often we get caught up in the "personal" aspect and forget that we are part of a larger body. Simply put, being Holy Spirit filled isn't a 'Get out of Church free card'. 
Sug. Activities: You can place flames of fire above the heads of the disciples and make swirls of wind on white paper. Cut out the swirls and attach them to the top part of the game board. This is to show that the Holy Spirit came with wind and fire. You can also fill the basket with "hot" candy like fireballs and "windy" candy like peppermint. Lastly, you can attach a blue or white dove on the basket to represent the Holy Spirit and have him descend with the treats.

Even though Easter is over, you need not end all activities so abruptly because Pentecost didn't end activities of the early Christians, but rather started them going. One activity that we do in our own home is called the Kindness Campaign. Our children are asked to do one act of kindness per week. They can mow the lawn for an older person, deliver mail to a shut-in or take groceries to person's car at the local supermarket. We allow the children to lead the activities and they have come up with great ideas. Yes, these are things we should be doing whenever the opportunity arises, but once in a while we need practice on our basic principles.
