From the Desk of Fr. Seán



Today we celebrate the beginning of Catholic Schools Week for 2013 and the theme for this year is: "Catholic Schools Raise the Standards"

At the outset, let me take this opportunity to congratulate and thank the administration, faculty and staff of our Regional Catholic School ~ Holy Family Regional ~ for the outstanding educational experience they offer our youngsters. Scripture Reflection

3rd Sunday In Ordinary Time



Erza proclaims the Word of the Lord, which gives us spirit and life. Jesus proclaims Himself the fulfillment of the Law and the

prophets. In Him we have become one body with many members.

Today's news is tomorrow's history. News reporting is the seedbed of history. Sometimes the reporter is present at the event. Other times, the report is based on interviews with those who have first-hand knowledge of what happened. St. Luke did not come on the scene until some years after the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. But he was a painstaking and reliable reporter. He met and worked with many who had shared the life of Jesus and the apostles, possibly even meeting Mary who had been there before the crib and after the cross. From such sources, he gleaned accurate and full accounts of the life and teaching of Jesus. He put order on these stories to present Jesus as God who became human to show God's merciful forgiveness of all people.

As we hear Luke's gospel read on the coming Sundays, we realize that as well as being history, this gospel story is alive and life giving. It points up the links between us and Jesus. His work recounted in today's gospel is continued in the church through each one of us. Just as Jesus was anointed to bring good news to the poor, so each baptized follower is enabled by the Holy Spirit to give sight to those blinded by selfishness, to free those entrapped by guilt, to awaken hope in the downtrodden. To merely hear the gospel and not allow it to inspire one to a joyful living of its message is to ignore the nourishment our faith needs today. Faith is nurtured through gospel living. Undernourished faith quickly dies. Shared faith never dies.

"The God who gave us life gave us liberty at the same time,"

said Thomas Jefferson, two years before he wrote the Declaration of Independence. He and the other founders of our Nation grasped a profound truth when they listed our God-given inalienable rights as "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness." Life is our most basic right, the condition for all others – no other right is secure if our very lives can be taken from us. Freedom of conscience, culminating in the right to worship and serve God, is the highest fulfillment of our God-given human nature, for without it we cannot freely return God's love and serve our brothers and sisters who need our help and protection.

When government attacks religious freedom – especially when it attacks our freedom to respect and revere life at its most defenseless – the fabric of our society is placed at risk.

Yet this is what state and federal governmental bodies have done in recent months, demanding new action by the Catholic community. Among the recent disturbing developments:

- The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) has demanded that almost every man and woman in America, as well as many religious institutions that help the needy, may not provide or purchase health coverage unless that coverage includes a wide array of sterilization and "contraceptive" methods, including drugs that can induce abortion.
- After the Catholic Church's migration and refugee services office had provided excellent service to victims of human trafficking for five years, HHS took away its federal grant and gave it to less qualified secular agencies because the Catholic agency would not violate its moral principles on early human life.
- Some state government officials have tried to make Catholic organizations include coverage for abortions in health plans for their employees, or help provide abortions and sterilizations in order to participate fully in our health care system.

Longstanding federal laws known as "conscience clauses" should be preventing such abuses. But government officials have found ways to ignore these laws or exploit loopholes in them to suppress freedom of conscience in health care. In 2013 the new Congress must address this crisis.

Federal lawmakers may act to maintain and improve current protections for life and liberty – or they may mandate expanded taxpayer funding for the destruction of unborn children, and allow these and other abuses against religious freedom to continue. It is important that concerned citizens express their views to their Senators and Representative as soon as possible.

Forty years ago, the U.S. Supreme Court created a "right" to choose abortion that has resulted in the death of millions of unborn children and has promoted a fundamental disrespect for life. Today those promoting the "right" to abortion manifest an intolerance toward those who would choose in favor of God's gift of life. Americans who believe in the sacredness of life and the right of religious freedom need to raise their voices now.

Your voice is needed more than ever!

Congress should come together to respect life and religious freedom.

Government must not force Americans to violate their religious and moral beliefs on respect for life when they provide health care or sponsor or purchase health coverage. Your help is urgently needed!
