From the Desk of Fr. Seán

On Thursday of this past week, the Church celebrated the feast day of St. John Bosco and it had me thinking about his extraordinary work among the young people of his day... and to think of how we're doing in keeping our young people connected to our parish life and to Jesus.

While still a child, John Bosco's father's death made him feel the sorrow of so many orphans for whom he would become a loving father. He found, in his mother Margaret, an example of Christian life which made a deep impression on his soul.

When he was nine years old, he had a dream that was prophetic. He seemed to be in the middle of a crowd of children at play, some of whom were cursing. Suddenly, the young John threw himself at them, cursing, hitting and kicking them to make them be quiet. But a man appeared before him who said: "Don't hit them, but with kindness and love you must win over these your friends. ... I shall give you a Teacher under whose guidance you will be able to become wise, and without whom, all wisdom becomes nonsense". That person was Jesus and the Teacher, the Virgin Mary, under whose guidance, he placed his whole life and whom he honored with the title "Mary, Help of Christians".

In those times, Turin was chock-a-block full of poor young people. These were either orphaned or abandoned, looking for work, and were exposed to many dangers of both body and soul. Don Bosco started to gather them together on Sundays, sometimes in a Church, out on a grassy meadow, or yet again in a town square to get them to play and to instruct them in the Catechism.

Don Bosco was loved no end by his "rascals" (as he used to call them). Whenever anyone asked him the secret of such success, he would reply, "With kindness and love I try to win over these friends of mine for the Lord". On them, he spent what little money he had, his time, his most extraordinary talent and his health. With them, he became a saint.

Now, I only get to spend limited time with our youngsters, and in a "church setting", so I can well imagine that when I see the young people of our parish, it's in circumstances where they are most likely better behaved than you might find them at home. However, I have to tell you... I'm very proud of our young people and I'm especially pleased with the level of involvement in which I find them in parish activities. Here are a few examples...

community.
The Teen Helpers who assist our Religious Ed Staff when classes are in session.
The Children's and Teen Choirs who come so faithfully for rehearsal each week and are
preparing to participate in the 2013 Children's Choir Festival.
Our wonderful and faithful Altar Servers who assist at Mass each weekend.
The children of our Regional Catholic School who last weekend did such a superb job in
welcoming those who came to our Open House.
Our Junior Hibernians who are actively planning their Annual Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper
on February 12 th and then donate their proceeds to a worthy charity.
Our Gospel Drama Players who so beautifully make the Scripture come alive with their dramatic
presentations throughout the year at the 11:00 AM Family Mass.
If I've overlooked anyone please pardon me!

And folks, here's an interesting note... all these activities have happened just recently or will happen very soon! I suppose we can scratch our heads and wonder what's the matter with kids today... just like our parents did... but I think St. John Bosco would be happy with the many different ways our youngsters can stay connected to parish life ~ and to the Lord Jesus.

It would seem easiest to just not offer the Precious Blood. However, there are some folks who weren't happy with that decision in the past, and there are a number of parishioners who, for health reasons, can only participate in Communion by partaking of the Precious Blood.

So, we will continue to offer Communion under both forms for the present moment but we would strongly urge you to exercise common sense and prudence. If you're feeling unwell or are wary of catching something, <u>PLEASE</u>, <u>DO</u> NOT RECEIVE FROM THE CHALICE.

Additionally, at the Sign of Peace you may want to refrain from shaking hands with those around you. A nod of the head accompanied by a sincere smile can be an effective way of communicating Christ's peace to one another.

Scripture Reflection

4th Sunday In Ordinary Time



"No prophet is accepted in the prophets hometown." Thus did Jeremiah, and later Jesus, encounter opposition and lack of faith.

Peace is much more than the absence of violence. It involves mutual respect and acceptance of differences as well as the surrender of privilege and prejudice. Similarly, truth is much more than not telling lies. It permeates every aspect of our communication with each other. Indeed, truth is the lifeblood of all our relationships. It must affirm what is best as well as alerting us to the selfishness and the blindness that can endanger even the most precious things in our shared lives. Avoidance of lies is like an outer defense wall, necessary but sterile in itself. It forms a safe haven where our interpersonal relationships can take root. But they can only blossom and bear fruit in an atmosphere of open, sensitive and creative honesty. Such honesty in pointing out destructive failure to others can be very painful, especially when the recipients are locked into self-righteous security.

This is what happened in today's gospel. Jesus pointed out to contemporary Jewish religious leaders that they had failed to truly appreciate their heritage as children of God and that God's salvation is for all peoples. His listeners disliked the message and set about destroying the messenger. Yet, for Jesus to have remained silent would have been a cowardly failure to speak the truth. He spoke not to condemn but to point out a better way.

Sometimes, perhaps often, we lack his caring courage. We shield ourselves with self-deceptive layers of not hurting others or not interfering even when we know deep down that the truth is calling us to take the less traveled road. Yet such wise courage in truth is essential for the wellbeing of each family and association, in church and state. We all need to have such courage sometimes, even at the risk of being rejected. Good is only accomplished at great cost to those who do it.

"The God who gave us life gave us liberty at the same time,"

said Thomas Jefferson, two years before he wrote the Declaration of Independence. He and the other founders of our Nation grasped a profound truth when they listed our God-given inalienable rights as "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness." Life is our most basic right, the condition for all others – no other right is secure if our very lives can be taken from us. Freedom of conscience, culminating in the right to worship and serve God, is the highest fulfillment of our God-given human nature, for without it we cannot freely return God's love and serve our brothers and sisters who need our help and protection.

When government attacks religious freedom – especially when it attacks our freedom to respect and revere life at its most defenseless – the fabric of our society is placed at risk.

Yet this is what state and federal governmental bodies have done in recent months, demanding new action by the Catholic community. Among the recent disturbing developments:

- The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) has demanded that almost every man and woman in America, as well as many religious institutions that help the needy, may not provide or purchase health coverage unless that coverage includes a wide array of sterilization and "contraceptive" methods, including drugs that can induce abortion.
- After the Catholic Church's migration and refugee services office had provided excellent service to victims of human trafficking for five years, HHS took away its federal grant and gave it to less qualified secular agencies because the Catholic agency would not violate its moral principles on early human life.
- Some state government officials have tried to make Catholic organizations include coverage for abortions in health plans for their employees, or help provide abortions and sterilizations in order to participate fully in our health care system.

Longstanding federal laws known as "conscience clauses" should be preventing such abuses. But government officials have found ways to ignore these laws or exploit loopholes in them to suppress freedom of conscience in health care. In 2013 the new Congress must address this crisis.

Federal lawmakers may act to maintain and improve current protections for life and liberty – or they may mandate expanded taxpayer funding for the destruction of unborn children, and allow these and other abuses against religious freedom to continue. It is important that concerned citizens express their views to their Senators and Representative as soon as possible.

Forty years ago, the U.S. Supreme Court created a "right" to choose abortion that has resulted in the death of millions of unborn children and has promoted a fundamental disrespect for life. Today those promoting the "right" to abortion manifest an intolerance toward those who would choose in favor of God's gift of life. Americans who believe in the sacredness of life and the right of religious freedom need to raise their voices now.

Your voice is needed more than ever!

Congress should come together to respect life and religious freedom.

Government must not force Americans to violate their religious and moral beliefs on respect for life when they provide health care or sponsor or purchase health coverage. Your help is urgently needed!



Lenten Regulations

Abstinence

All Catholics who have reached their $14^{\rm th}$ year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent.

Fasting

All Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59, inclusive, are also bound to observe the law of fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day.

Penance

The obligation to do penance and to observe the appointed penitential season is a serious one. Those whose work or health would be impaired are excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from Ash Wednesday and Good Friday fast and abstinence.

Statement on Gov. Cuomo's Abortion Expansion Proposal

Kathleen M. Gallagher, director of pro-life activities for the New York State Catholic Conference, issued the following statement in response to the promotion of a radical abortion bill by Governor Andrew Cuomo:

"Governor Andrew Cuomo's re-packaging of an extreme abortion bill into a so-called 'women's agenda' is a desperate attempt to push through an abortion expansion that's been around for six years and has failed to gain traction as a stand-alone bill. Make no mistake, this bill, first championed by Eliot Spitzer, is radical and far out of the mainstream, even by the standards of New York, a state with an abortion rate twice the national average. It will permit more late-term abortions, allow non-doctors to perform abortions, and will preclude any reasonable restrictions on abortion like parental notification. Moreover it would permit the state to pull the operating certificate of Catholic hospitals and agencies that 'discriminate' by not performing or referring women for abortions.

"The extreme nature of the bill has seriously limited its support in the Legislature. So now the governor is attempting to tie it to important initiatives such as helping victims of domestic violence and human trafficking, and ending pregnancy discrimination in the workplace. He believes the 'all-in' strategy will make it harder to oppose. The public and lawmakers should not be fooled. We must not let victims of abuse and discrimination be held hostage to Governor Cuomo's ideologically driven political agenda, an agenda that is extremely harmful to mothers, infants and religious liberty.

"An abortion expansion in New York State will not foster women's health or women's dignity. New Yorkers want their leaders to take action to decrease the state's abortion rate and reduce the tragedy for women and families. We would like to work with them to do just that."

The Catholic Conference represents Timothy Cardinal Dolan and New York State's Bishops in matters of public policy.
