

Racism is a Spiritual Matter...and It Does Matter

he death of Freddie Gray in Baltimore last city. The extent of the demonstrations indicated the hurt in Baltimore's communities over the deep-seated inequities of conditions and treatment.

Since then, the Baltimore Presbytery has participated in "Race and Reconciliation" meetings of the Baltimore faith community.

At the most recent Presbytery gathering a presentation on "Unconscious Bias" was made

that was followed by break-out sessions into smaller groups, which included role playing. Following this, participants were invited to discuss questions of race and equity more closely at monthly dinners, the first three to be hosted by Knox Presbyterian Church in Baltimore.

On March 29, the first of these dinners drew more than thirty people-men and women of different ag-

es, black and white, from the city and several coun-April led to numerous demonstrations in the ties. Several of the Knox congregation prepared and served a lovely dinner; one of the servers was an eight-year-old boy who was particularly gracious, polite, and helpful.

> The bible verse used for the opening discussion was Luke 24: 13–35, which tells of the walk on the road to Emmaus. In our journeys to Emmaus, what does God want us to do? Knox Presbyterian's Rev. Michael Moore

guided the evening and invited each attendee to "take your time and tell us why you are here."

Some spoke of how the faith community responded immediately at the time of the crisis in helping in the streets and of how inspiring this ongoing leadership is today. Some came directly as a result of the insight realized from the discussion on "unconscious bias" at the Presbytery. Several revealed real hurts

experiencing racism in their lifetimes. Many shared different life influences and experiences that have led to personal empathy in this real question of everyday life. Some shared turning points across cultures.

Will this help? The result of listening to each of the attendees' answers was very moving. Indeed we felt the presence of God—the hurts and experiences and insights were generously explored and received with respect. Rev. Moore recommended a book, *The Four Agreements* by Don Miguel Ruiz, to help build this dialogue and help us in this journey.

At the end of the evening, a proposal was made that each person team with another attendee to make a pledge to do something as a follow-up, as a commitment to this journey. I vowed to write an article for my church's newsletter and my partner vowed to tell others of the discussion and get others from his church to join him next month.


The next dinner at Knox took place on April 19. This time there were more than forty people. The bible verse for the evening was John 9: I—41, where Jesus

heals a man born blind. The discussion brought out issues of challenging those who hold power and how some people refuse to "see" differently from their deeply ingrained beliefs. It included examples of spiritual blindness, circumstances of slavery and intimidation.

For us today the discussion includes "White privilege" and "Black protest" - with a gut-wrenching question of "is racism permanent?" During the unrest and demonstrations last year, there was a riot at a CVS, but the underlying reality was powerlessness. How do we in the broader community help turn this upside down? Can we become both White and Black prophets for change?

As the "church"—yes we want to strengthen our community and attend to the concerns of everyday life. In the Baltimore Presbytery there are 68 churches, with more than 16,000 people. To me this proposal of encouraging us all to be prophets for change, Black and White together, is a good response to having God walk with us!
