Tilghman. Submissions will be accepted at any time up to the **deadline date of April 25th** in anticipation of meeting the publication date of September 1st.

GUIDELINES:

Poems must be the **original work** of the poet.

- 2. Both published and unpublished poems will be accepted.
- 3. Line limit: **Maximum 38** including title and both printed and blank spaces.
- 4. Character Count: Max 55 characters including spaces and punctuation marks per line.
- 5. 12 Point Times New Roman font. Single-Space.
- 6. **INCLUDE A ONE PAGE BIO. NO** photos or illustration.
- 7. Poems may be submitted by USPS mail to:

PLEASE SUBMIT THREE POEMS. Your poems may be one page each, or more.

IN ADDITION, members may SUBMIT A ONE PAGE POEM to be featured in the special section reserved for poems with any Oklahoma related theme written in any form. The viator is a poetic form invented by Robin Skelton, author of *The Shapes of Our Singing*. The rules are fairly simple:

The first line is a refrain

The refrain appears as the second line of the second stanza, third line of the third stanza, and so on for however many stanzas the poem has...

...with the final line of the final stanza being the refrain

By the later part of that century, poets like Walt Whitman were winning an enthusiastic audience abroad and had joined the English-language <u>avant-garde</u>.

Much of the American poetry published between 1910 and 1945 remains lost in the pages of small circulation political periodicals, particularly the ones on the far left, destroyed by librarians during the 1950s McCarthy era. [2] Modernist poets like Ezra Pound and T.S. Eliot (who was awarded the Nobel Prize in Literature in 1948) are often cited as creative and influential English-language poets of the first half of the 20th century. [3] African American and women poets were published and read widely in the same period but were often somewhat prejudicially marginalized. By the 1960s, the Beat Movement and Black Mountain poets had developed new models for poetry and their contemporaries influenced the British Poetry Revival. Towards the end of the millennium, consideration of American poetry had diversified, as scholars placed an increased emphasis on poetry by women, African Americans, Hispanics, Chicanos, Native Americans, and other ethnic groups. Louise Glück is the only contemporary American writer writing primarily poetry who has been awarded the Nobel Prize in Literature, while Bob Dylan, a folk-rock songwriter and poet, has been awarded the same prize.
