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CELEBRATING NATIONAL POETRY MONTH



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Rep. Tammy West Recognizes April as National Poetry Month

OKLAHOMA CITY – Each year she's been in office, House Majority Leader Tammy West, R-Oklahoma City, has recognized April as National Poetry Month in the state of Oklahoma through passage of a House Resolution. West said the request came from House District 84 constituent Patti Koch.

"It's an honor to carry this request for my friend and constituent," West said. "Poetry is a soother for the soul. It inspires, unites and enriches our lives, and brings moments of joy and contemplation in an often rushed and busy world," West said.

House Resolution 1005 was adopted by unanimous consent in the House or Representatives on Monday, April 3.

In addition to presenting the resolution on the House floor, West read part of the poem "Heroes of Old," written by Oklahoma State Poet Laureate for 2023-24, Jay Snider of Cyril. Snider was recognized on the House floor before HR 1005 was adopted.

The Academy of American Poets established April as National Poetry Month in 1996. The intent is to highlight the extraordinary legacy and ongoing achievement of American poets, to introduce Americans to the pleasures and benefits of reading poetry, to bring poets and poetry to the public in immediate and innovative ways, and make poetry and important part of our children's education.

The resolution notes that National Poetry Month is now the largest literary celebration in the world. It posits that poetry is an essential part of arts and humanities and affects every aspect of life in America today, including education, the economy and community pride and development. It further notes that poetry has produced some of the nation's leading creative artists and has inspired other artists in fields such as music, theater, film, dance and the visual arts.

Finally, the resolution encourages public officials, educators, librarians and all people of Oklahoma to observe this month, to celebrate the cultural riches our state has to offer, and to recognize the important role of poetry in creating this great nation with appropriate ceremonies, activities and programs.

The 2004 Oklahoma Lore sixth grade contest subject was changed to The Oklahoma Rose. First Prize winner Lauren Snyder read her poem *The Oklahoma Rose* to the Oklahoma State Senate. On February 23, 2004 the Senate voted 44-0 to pass the bill that named the Oklahoma Rose as the State Flower of Oklahoma.

Soon after former PSO Treasurer Mary M. Chase was asked by co-Presidents Vivian Stewart and Billy Pennington to draw a logo for the Poetry Society of Oklahoma.

The Oklahoma Rose on the PSO logo symbolizes the cooperation between the Oklahoma City Garden Club and PSO to bring Dottie M. Wissenberger's four decade dream into reality.

The Oklahoma State Flower has a long and rich history. To most people, it is just a pretty flower, but to the indigenous tribes that lived in the area before European settlers arrived, it was a sign from God. The tribes would often use these flowers to make medicine. They felt that this plant had great healing powers and was able to use it for many different purposes like treating pain and fever as well as using it as an antiseptic.

The Oklahoma rose is a beautiful flower that symbolizes strength, courage, and resilience. This flower is often given to people who are going through a tough time, as a way to show them that they have the strength to get through it. The Oklahoma rose is a beautiful flower that has many different meanings. It can represent love, appreciation, and even sympathy. What better logo for our Poetry Society of Oklahoma!
