Writer-Friendly Habits

Have you ever had a time when you wanted to write but just could not get started? Writer's block or a dearth of inspiration hits most of us from time to time.

Maria Polson Veres is a freelance writer, creative writing teacher, author of four books of poetry, AND a PSO member. In her monthly newsletter, she lists ways to keep writing momentum going. These are writer-friendly habits she has developed and found useful.

Keep a journal, an easy, low-pressure way to put words on the page.

Always keep a notebook handy, at home and away. Ideas, lines, words, sometimes entire poems, may come to you at any time. If you prefer to keep notes digitally, you can also jot them on your phone.

Do regular, deadlined work. Contest entries are a prime example. Even business and personal letters require a certain amount of creativity, and they keep your skills moving forward.

Belong to a critique group, to build accountability and production.

Work on a book. Whether the subject is poetry, plays, memoir, historical research, fiction, or a children's book, keeping a project going provides a long-term goal to work towards.

Take guilt-free breaks. Sometimes the best thing you can do for yourself as a writer is to step back from writing entirely and enjoy other parts of your life.

Recent Publications

Karen Kay Bailey's recent publication, *Witnesses Along the Washita*, has been reviewed and catalogued in the Oklahoma Historical Society's Research Center in Oklahoma City, as well as each of the eight Libraries in the Western Plains Library System, including locations in Washita, Custer, Dewey and Roger Mills Counties.

The poems were written in the Persona Form which allowed the author to embody and speak for the distinctive cast of voiceless characters.... to imagine what transpired on that momentous day if not a Cheyenne or soldier. They reflect on The Battle of the Washita between the Southern Cheyenne Tribe and the United States Army in 1868.

Trina Lee's first book of poems, *And...Then...* is a collection about love, loss and coping.

Audrey Streetman's *River of Light* features poems rooted in the touchstones of faith, memory, and spiritual quest.

Maria Polson Veres' 4th book of poetry, entitled *The Breaking Place*, reflects her journey of seeking, questioning, and healing during the difficult times of the Covid-19 pandemic."
