May's Poetry Form ~ Minute Poem from http://www.poetrydances.com/

The Minute Poem is a poem that follows the "8,4,4,4" syllable count structure. It usually has 3 stanzas that are exactly the same. So: 8,4,4,4; 8,4,4,4 syllables.

A traditional Minute Poem has 12 lines total. It has 60 syllables. It is written in a strict iambic meter. The rhyme scheme is as follows: aabb, ccdd, eeff.

In this traditional example the author included both the rhyme scheme (aabb, ccdd, eeff) and the syllable count (8.4,4.4 for each stanza).

thousand dollars (\$1,000), publication of the winning manuscript, and fifty (50) copies of the resulting book! This competition is open to all poets writing in English, except for previous Stevens Competition winners. Manuscripts is to be original work by a single author.

Now, you may be asking why this information is important? Because our own PSO Past President, John Coppock is this year's winner! TaDa! And, **CONGRATULATIONS**, John!

When asked about this award John said, "I have a perspective I think from which others can draw inspiration.

Moral of my story: Live long, learn lots, and don't give up. I think many in our group could win The Stevens just by arranging and upgrading the collective works. Nothing is prohibited because of prior publication nor prizes. The elephant graveyard of old poems can be sensitively visited.

The Stevens Poetry Manuscript Competition let me stop kicking myself for my naiveté. When I began winning prizes and accolades from poets like James Dickey and Thom Gunn for poetry in the 60's, I didn't realize that first publication in a college journal eliminated that poem from publication in any premiere journal. *The Atlantic* (Dickey the editor) couldn't print "No Day for Rest." My goal to be in *Poetry* was limited only to unpublished works and just how many fine works does one have? I had only those in my youth already published. I changed strategy and allowed only previously published poems to be published again, my saving the others for non-publishing competitions. Now old, in a time of vulnerability, best poems need a refresh and the new ones need wide, durable voicing. The NFSPS provided such a valuable venue permitting a reissuance of our best work and whatever more we wish to add, with professional publication and a big cash prize to boot. Consider organizing an entry in this time of hunkering down. Salvage all those early works from the quiet of your bookshelves."
